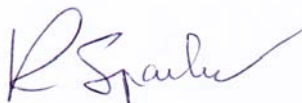

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# About This Guide...

This guide is designed to supplement and clarify the School of Human Kinetics information in the current UBC Calendar and course listings available online at <https://courses.students.ubc.ca/cs/main>. ## **THE SCHOOL OF HUMAN KINETICS**

Human Kinetics is a cross-disciplinary body of knowledge which focuses on the bio-physical and psycho-social dimensions of human movement, exercise, sport, and play and the cultural context within which these elements of human behaviour have developed and occur. Problems studied in the School of Human Kinetics range from cellular analyses of neuromuscular function and psycho-social factors influencing human movement, to analyses of social and cultural transformations in the role and functions of play, exercise and sport.

The term Human Kinetics was selected as the name of the School with the understanding that it encompassed the study of human movement from a life/physical science, a social/behavioural science, and a humanities perspective. Thus, our undergraduate specializations of Interdisciplinary Studies, Kinesiology and Health Science, Physical and Health Education, as well as our graduate degree areas of bioenergetics, socio-managerial and behavioural research, are all subsumed under the more generic term, Human Kinetics.

### **Which Students are REQUIRED To Visit The Undergraduate Advising Centre**

- All transfer students (*before registering in courses*)
- All students regarding the selection of the senior Non-HKIN elective credits (*prior to registering in 3<sup>rd</sup> year*)
- All students who are taking a BHK as their second degree (*prior to registering for courses*)
- All HKIN students who are seeking permission to deviate in any way from the prescribed program of study prior to registering for courses
- All students who are seeking permission to fulfill HKIN degree requirements away from UBC (*prior to commencing off-campus studies*)

# ADMISSIONS

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## **Applying for Admission**

Any student wishing to enroll in the School of Human Kinetics must apply through the UBC Registrar's Office. Application deadline date is February 28<sup>th</sup> for September start.

## **Admission Requirements**

A minimum average of 67% is required for admission to UBC; however, due to limited enrolment, a higher average may be required in the School of Human Kinetics. The following is a list of the final averages required of students applying for admission to the School of Human Kinetics for September 2005. Since these averages are subject to change, please contact the Admission Office of the Registrar at (604) 822-3014 or (604) 822-5544 for complete information regarding current GPA requirements.

## **2005 Admission Averages**

- ◆ For in and out of province students (from highschool) into 1st Year = 86.0%
- ◆ Faculty, College and University transfers to 1st Year = 75.0%
- ◆ College/University transfers to 2nd Year = 3.2% (75%)
- ◆ College/University transfers to 3rd Year = 3.2% (75%)

## **Pre-Admission Advising**

Due to limited resources, the School of Human Kinetics cannot provide pre-admission advising for students who have not been admitted to the University. Students who have not been admitted to UBC and who require information regarding application of transfer credits or other previous education to the Human Kinetics degree must make application to the University before credit equivalency and outstanding degree requirements can be determined. # REGISTRATION

## Registering for Courses

Under normal circumstances students should register for their courses by utilizing Online Registration. Students who are unable to access Online Registration should seek assistance from the Undergraduate Advising Centre.

*\* It is very important to change your PIN number when registering for your courses to maintain confidentiality regarding your grades, courses and fees.*

## Registration Date

The date of your registration, as indicated by the Registrar's Office, is determined by the following factors: grades from previous session; \*year standing in the School of Human Kinetics.

*\*The year standing of a Human Kinetics student is determined by the number of Human Kinetics credits and non-Human Kinetics credits completed in the chosen program of study. (See promotion requirements below). Students who have questions regarding their assigned year standing should consult the Undergraduate Advising Centre.*

## Determining Degree Requirements

In order to obtain a BHK degree students must 1) fulfill the 120 credit requirement and complete 60 credits at UBC. BHK students may not receive a degree without completing the equivalent of two winter sessions (60 credits) in attendance at the University, one of which should be the final year. This regulation applies to all students, including transfer students from colleges or other institutions, education abroad students, and students who are pursuing a second undergraduate degree. 2) satisfy all the program requirements by completing studies either at UBC or elsewhere 3) satisfy at least 50% of the credits required for the program while registered in the program; and 4) complete upper-division UBC credits to satisfy at least 50% of the credits required by point (3) above.

## Promotion Requirements

### YEAR STANDING/PROMOTION REQUIREMENTS

- **FROM YEAR 1 TO YEAR 2**

- IDHK, KINH, and PEDH Programs: Successful completion of 18 total credits including: HKIN 103, 151, 161 and 190, and 191.

- **FROM YEAR 2 TO YEAR 3**

- IDHK, KINH, and PEDH: Successful completion of 48 total credits including: ENGL 112, HKIN 103, 151, 161, 190, 191, 230, 231, 261, 275, and 284.

- **FROM YEAR 3 TO YEAR 4**

Successful completion of at least 78 or more appropriate credits which must include ENGL 112, 1<sup>st</sup> year and 2<sup>nd</sup> year HKIN core courses.

# COMPLETING DEGREE REQUIREMENTS

## Wait List Registration

If, when registering on Online Registration you find that you cannot register into the course you want because it is full, Online Registration should prompt you to register into the wait list section if one is available. **Being registered in a wait list section does not guarantee you a seat in the actual class.** HKIN wait list sections are reviewed after the initial class has taken place. (4th Year HKIN students automatically have priority into HKIN program required classes provided the course is needed for graduation. *4th Year HKIN students will not automatically get a seat if the course is being used as an elective in their program.*) Priority on the wait list section is given to students with the highest year level and earliest Online Registration date onto the wait list. For example a 3rd Year HKIN student will have priority over a 2nd Year HKIN student; however, among all 3rd Year HKIN students the date of registration gives priority.

**NOTE:** It is not possible for the Online Registration system or the Undergraduate Advising Centre to ascertain students' position in the wait list section. Students are responsible for checking their registration by accessing the Online Registration system. Transfers from wait lists will be indicated on the Online Registration. Students are also responsible FOR DE-REGISTERING FROM ANY WAIT LISTS and checking to see if they have been placed in the course.

## Prerequisites and Corequisites

Students should carefully check the UBC Calendar on the web, School of Human Kinetics course descriptions (see Appendix I) to determine the prerequisite and corequisite requirements in School of Human Kinetics courses.

Students who register in a course without having successfully completed any prerequisite course work, or without having written authorization from a course instructor, may be removed from the course.

Authorization from the course instructor and the Undergraduate Advising Centre is required to drop courses after posted withdrawal dates. Requests will not be considered without a rationale.

## Failed Courses

No failed course may be repeated more than once without special permission of the School of Human Kinetics. The School of Human Kinetics does not offer supplemental examinations.

## Program of Study

All BHK students are required to choose a Program of Study (*specialization*) in order to register for 3<sup>rd</sup> year courses through Online Registration. Students are responsible for the completeness and accuracy of their registration as it relates to the requirements of their Program of Study and BHK degree.

# COMPLETING DEGREE REQUIREMENTS

## Minors

Students who wish to focus their non Human Kinetics electives may, with the approval in writing of the School of Human Kinetics Advisor, undertake an optional Minor program in conjunction with the Bachelor of Human Kinetics degree. All courses in the Minor must be taken outside of the School of Human Kinetics. There are four types of Minors available.

### Minor in Arts

An acceptable program must comprise courses in the Faculty of Arts that are for credit towards a Bachelor of Arts degree and consists of 18 upper-level credits in a single subject field or specialization. Students should design a coherent, academically sound course of studies for their program Minor, which must be approved, in writing, by the School of Human Kinetics Advisor at the beginning of the second year. **All courses must be acceptable for a Bachelor of Arts Major in the proposed subject area or field**, but a student is not bound by the other requirements that the Faculty of Arts sets for a Major or Minor in the field. (Notes: 1) Students who wish to pursue a Minor in Arts should be aware of the prerequisites for many of the senior courses in arts. 2) Students who wish to pursue further studies in the Faculty of Education should be aware that courses which are acceptable for an Arts Minor may not necessarily meet the requirements for a teaching concentration in the Faculty of Education.) Upon successful completion of the Minor program, the notation, "Minor in Arts" will be denoted on the student's transcript.

### Minor in Science

An acceptable program must comprise courses recognized in the Faculty of Science that are for credit towards a Bachelor of Science degree and consist of at least 18 credits numbered 300 or higher in a single subject field or specialization, together with any necessary prerequisites. Students should design a coherent and academically sound course of studies for their proposed minor, which must be approved by the Human Kinetics Advisor, in writing, at the beginning of second year. **All courses must be acceptable for a Science Major in the proposed subject area or field**. (Notes: 1) Students who wish to pursue a Minor in Science should be aware of the prerequisites of many of the senior courses in Science. 2) Students who wish to pursue studies in the Faculty of Education should be aware that courses which are acceptable for a Minor in Science may not necessarily meet the requirements for a teaching concentration in the Faculty of Education). Upon successful completion of the Minor program, the notation "Minor in Science" will be denoted on the student's transcript.

### Minor in Commerce

Students wanting a foundation in business management are encouraged to consider the "Minor in Commerce." Enrolment in this program is limited to students eligible for third-year standing with a cumulative average of at least 68% in the previous two years. Enrolment in this program is strictly limited. Application forms may be obtained from the Advising Centre. Completed applications must be returned no later than May 15. Upon successful completion of this program, the notation Minor in Commerce will be placed on the student's transcript. The program will consist of COMM 329 (3), COMM 457 (3), COMM 465 (3), COMM 473 (3), COMM 493 (3); and one of COMM 398 (3) or COMM 458. Admission to the program requires completion of ECON 101 (3), ECON 102 (3); and one of MATH 100 (3), 102 (3), 104 (3), 120 (3), 180 (4) or 184 (4).

### Minor in Nutritional Science

Students wanting a foundation in nutrition are encouraged to consider the Minor in Nutritional Science. Students must be eligible for third-year standing with a cumulative average of at least 68% in the previous two years, and must have completed FNH 250. Enrolment in this program is strictly limited. Application forms may be obtained from the Advising Centre. Completed applications must be returned no later than May 15. Upon successful completion of this program, the notation Minor in Nutritional Science will be placed on the student's transcript. The program will consist of FNH 350, 351; and 12 credits from FNH 301 355, 370, 371, 402, 451, 470, 473, and 490.

# COMPLETING DEGREE REQUIREMENTS

**Note:** Students who pursue a Minor in Nutritional Science should be aware of the prerequisites for many of the upper level courses in Food, Nutrition and Health. Students may encounter difficulty fitting the FNH courses into their program timetable; careful planning is essential.

**Note:** Students who wish to pursue further studies in the Faculty of Education should be aware that courses which are acceptable for a Nutritional Science Minor may not necessarily meet the requirements for a teaching concentration in the Faculty of Education. Students planning to enter the Teacher Education Program in the Faculty of Education need to review the detailed admission requirements at [www.educ.ubc.ca/teacher\\_ed/bachelor.html](http://www.educ.ubc.ca/teacher_ed/bachelor.html). Students planning to apply for the secondary option must prepare a second teaching field.

## **Changing Program of Study**

Students who wish to change their Program of Study must receive **PRIOR APPROVAL** from the Undergraduate Advising Centre. All requirements of the newly selected Program of Study must be met in order to fulfill BHK degree requirements.

## **Deviating From Program of Study Requirements**

Under certain special circumstances students may request to take courses which differ from the requirements of a Program of Study. Students who wish to request permission to deviate from Program of Study requirements must seek **PRIOR WRITTEN APPROVAL** from the Undergraduate Advising Centre.

## **Lower (Junior)/Upper (Senior) Credits**

Lower level credits: courses numbered 100 or 200.

Upper level credits: courses numbered 300 or 400.

**NOTE: lower level credits cannot be used to satisfy upper level credit requirements.**

## **Credit Requirements**

Each of the three programs of Study in the School of Human Kinetics requires completion of a minimum 120 credits. Students normally complete 30 credits of study per academic year. Under normal circumstances students must complete a minimum of 9 Human Kinetics credits per year and a maximum of 33 total credits per year. In special circumstances permission may be granted to deviate from the established credit limits. Such permission must be received from the Undergraduate Advising Centre prior to commencing studies.

## **Transfer Credits**

Students transferring to UBC from BC colleges or other institutions may receive transfer credit for studies completed at the previous institution. Transfer credit will be determined by UBC's Registrar's Office at the time of admission. No more than 60 credits can be transferred. (Consult the transfer credit charts in Appendix III for further information.)

# COMPLETING DEGREE REQUIREMENTS

## Unassigned Transfer Credits

If course work completed at another institution does not articulate (*course equivalency has not been previously determined by UBC*) with a specific UBC course, the Registrar's Office may apply unassigned transfer credit. These unassigned transfer credits can only be used to fulfill elective requirements and cannot be used in place of any specific HKIN course. The Registrar will determine the credit value and the UBC year of study to which the unassigned credit can be applied.

## Precluded Credit

In assigning transfer credits, the Registrar's Office sometimes assigns a "preclusion" to certain Human Kinetics courses. The "preclusion" designation indicates that the course work is similar to an existing UBC course and therefore the UBC equivalent course cannot be taken at UBC. When courses are "precluded", the Registrar's Office applies a certain number of credits for the "precluded" course and assigns those credits to a specific year of study. Preclusions are common in the School of Human Kinetics for HKIN 361, 364 and 368. Three credits are awarded for each of these courses at Year 2. Students who have received preclusions for these 3<sup>rd</sup> Year UBC courses should be aware that transfer credit can be applied only to fulfill 2<sup>nd</sup> Year Elective requirements. **THE UPPER LEVEL HKIN CREDIT DEFICITS THAT EXIST BECAUSE OF PRECLUDED CREDITS MUST BE MADE UP BY TAKING ADDITIONAL UPPER LEVEL HUMAN KINETICS COURSE WORK AT UBC.**

## Second Degree Requirements

Students who have completed a previous undergraduate degree and wish to pursue a BHK as a 2<sup>nd</sup> degree must successfully complete all BHK program requirements and successfully complete a minimum of 60 credits of study at UBC. In certain cases, course work from the previous degree may be applied to fulfill BHK degree requirements. **SECOND DEGREE STUDENTS MUST HAVE THEIR PROGRAM APPROVED IN WRITING BY THE UNDERGRADUATE ADVISING CENTRE.**

## Off Campus Study

BHK students who wish permission to take any courses outside of UBC must receive **prior** written approval from the Undergraduate Advising Centre. Students who complete credit toward their BHK degree at another institute may obtain transfer credit from that institution ONLY IF PRIOR WRITTEN PERMISSION has been obtained from the Undergraduate Advising Centre.

## Go Global - <http://students.ubc.ca/global/>

BHK students who are accepted by Go Global must receive **PRIOR WRITTEN APPROVAL** from the School's Undergraduate Advisor before finalizing their program of studies at the host institution. It is normally expected that the final 30 credits of the student's BHK degree will be completed at UBC.

# ATTENDANCE

## General Regulations Regarding Attendance

Regular attendance is expected of students in all their classes (including lectures, laboratories, tutorials, seminars, etc.). Students who neglect their academic work and assignments may be excluded from writing the final examinations. Students who are unavoidably absent because of illness or disability should immediately report to their instructors on return to classes. (*Students enrolled in Performance Analysis courses should be aware of the attendance policy for Performance Analysis courses outlined in this guide on page 32.*) Students who know in advance that they will unavoidably be absent for midterms and from classes, should consult their instructors and the Undergraduate Advising Centre at the earliest possible date. The School will not normally take into account untimely notification. When such absences prevent the completion of midterms, exams, projects or other graded coursework, students are expected to follow the procedure outlined below under Academic Concession.

## Attendance at Initial Classes

**INITIAL CLASSES ARE THOSE HELD WITHIN THE FIRST WEEK OF EACH TERM. STUDENTS REGISTERED IN THE SCHOOL OF HUMAN KINETICS ARE REQUIRED TO ATTEND AND CONFIRM THEIR REGISTRATION IN CLASSES DURING THE FIRST WEEK OF EACH TERM. STUDENTS NOT ATTENDING INITIAL CLASSES MAY BE REMOVED FROM THE CLASS LIST TO MAKE ROOM FOR STUDENTS REGISTERED ON THE WAIT LIST. STUDENTS, WHO, DUE TO UNFORESEEN CIRCUMSTANCES, CANNOT ATTEND CLASSES DURING THE FIRST WEEK OF THE TERM, ARE RESPONSIBLE FOR NOTIFYING THEIR COURSE INSTRUCTORS IN WRITING PRIOR TO THE START OF THE TERM IN ORDER TO RETAIN A SEAT IN THE CLASS.**

## Attendance Policy – Final Examinations

Formal examinations are held in most courses in April and December. All students are expected to be available for formal examination periods. All prescribed examinations are mandatory. Students who miss an examination either in December or April because of medical, emotional or other problems must apply as soon as possible to the Undergraduate Advising Centre to request consideration for academic concession.

## Academic Concession

BHK students who are suffering from medical, emotional or other circumstances which may affect their attendance or performance in a course or program must notify the Undergraduate Advising Centre and their instructors as soon as possible. Students will be asked to complete an Academic Concession Form and, where appropriate, asked to provide supportive documentation. Academic concessions can be granted only by the Human Kinetics Advising office and are a privilege not a right. In case of illness students should consult the Academic Regulations and the Student Health Service sections of the UBC Calendar for further information.

## Extended Leaves From School

Students may take leave (*i.e. term/session*) from the university, without risk to their eligibility and continue their studies at a later date. Students who wish to interrupt their studies should inform the Undergraduate Advising Centre of their intentions in order to ensure that the correct procedures are followed.

# GRADUATION

## Applying for Graduation

*It is the responsibility of all BHK students to ensure they have fulfilled all graduation requirements. Students with questions regarding their graduation status should consult the Undergraduate Advising Centre.*

The Registrar will mail a graduation package to all **registered** 4th Year students in the month of January for May and November graduates. Once the forms in the package have been completed they must be returned to the Office of the Registrar located in Brock Hall. Do not submit these documents to the School of Human Kinetics. It is the student's responsibility to ensure that the Registrar's Office has an updated, current address on file.

Once the application deadline has passed, the Registrar will forward a compiled list of graduating candidates to the Undergraduate Advising Centre. At this time it is the responsibility of the School of Human Kinetics to verify that all degree requirements have (or have not) been met and to forward the results to the Registrar.

## Deadline Dates for Graduation Applications

Students wishing to graduate in May must submit their completed application forms prior to February 1<sup>st</sup>; students wishing to graduate in November must submit their completed application forms prior to August 15<sup>th</sup>. You can apply online at [www.students.ubc.ca](http://www.students.ubc.ca), log on to student services, at the bottom of the list on the left hand side there is a tab that says "graduation", click on it, and follow the step-by-step instructions.

*(Note: The above dates are subject to change. Confirm application dates with the Registrar's Office.)*

Students who have not received notification of their graduation status two weeks prior to graduation should contact the Undergraduate Advising Centre at 822-4512 or the Graduation Secretary of the Registrar's Office at 822-4455. Students whose graduation has been denied by the School must complete all outstanding requirements and **re-apply** with the Registrar for future graduation ceremonies.

## BHK Graduation Program Analysis (Grad Check)

BHK students may request a preliminary review of their program. Students who wish to have their program reviewed should first complete a program planning sheet and then request a "Grad Check" at the Undergraduate Advising Centre prior to the commencement of the final term of study. Although the School of Human Kinetics is not required by the University to evaluate graduation status prior to submission of the application to graduate, the Undergraduate Advising Centre will make every effort, pending available time and resources, to complete the reviews.

## Graduation Photos

Each year the HKUS subsidizes the graduate photo composite, which is then displayed at convocation and in the hall in War Memorial Gym. For information regarding graduation photos, contact the HKUS @ 822-6175.

# FIELD WORK, FIELD RESEARCH PRACTICUM AND PROJECT COURSES (HKIN 454, 455 AND 499)

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## **HKIN 454 Courses**    (*HKIN 454 courses are field work seminar courses*)

There are four HKIN 454 sections. Students are responsible for choosing the correct section with respect to their Program of Study. (*Students may take a maximum of six credits of 454 study, but may not repeat a section.*) **PLEASE NOTE THE PRE-REQUISITES FOR EACH 454 SECTION.**

- ⇒ **HKIN 454A – *Athletic Training*** requires the successful completion of HKIN 361.
- ⇒ **HKIN 454B – *Kinesiology & Health Science*** requires the successful completion of all 2nd Year HKIN courses. *It is highly recommended that KINH students have also completed HKIN 303, 353 and 464 prior to taking HKIN 454B.*
- ⇒ **HKIN 454C – *Physical & Health Education*** requires the successful completion of 2<sup>nd</sup> year and HKIN 369.
- ⇒ **HKIN 454D – *Interdisciplinary Studies*** requires the successful completion of 2nd Year.

## **HKIN 455 Field Work and Field Research Practicum - 15 Credits**

Students must apply and be accepted in order to complete this full time, full term practicum. Students who are accepted to a HKIN 455 Field Research Practicum are not permitted to complete any other course work in that term. Prerequisites for HKIN 455 are 4th Year standing, the completion of HKIN 371 and 373 and application acceptance. An information meeting will be held during the school year.

## **HKIN 499 Projects in Human Kinetics**

HKIN 499 is designed to provide opportunities for students to perform independent research in a chosen area of study in Human Kinetics. Students in all three programs may choose to take HKIN 499 as an HKIN elective.

Students wishing to enrol in HKIN 499 must be in 4<sup>th</sup> year: and (1) seek out a faculty member who will approve and supervise the 499 project; (2) complete a 499 contract (available at the Undergraduate Advising Centre).

## Special Notes Regarding Performance Analysis Courses:

1. **Evaluation:** Students will be evaluated in both the cognitive and practical dimensions of each performance area. A final examination will be held at the conclusion of each activity. The final examination for Phase 1 activities will be held in class on the last scheduled day of the class. The final examination for Phase 2 activities will occur during the University's formal examination period.
2. **Attendance Policy:** Students are expected to attend and participate in all scheduled classes (including lectures and laboratory sessions) in each subject area. Unauthorized absence from more than two classes in any subject area is considered unsatisfactory. A student may be denied the privilege of writing the final examination and participating in the final laboratory evaluations in any subject area because of unsatisfactory attendance. In this case, course credits cannot be granted. Students who are unavoidably absent due to illness or disability should report to the instructor on return to class.
3. **Course Expenses:** In addition to the normal tuition fee, several performance analysis courses require additional costs. These may include: 1) NCCP Certification Fee; and 2) copying fees for student hand-outs.

## ADDITIONAL GUIDANCE FOR PHYSICAL AND HEALTH EDUCATION PROGRAM STUDENTS PLANNING TO ENTER THE FACULTY OF EDUCATION

As requirements are subject to change, PEDH Program students who intend to apply to the Faculty of Education should consult the Faculty of Education section of the Online UBC Calendar for specific details as well as receive counselling from the Teacher Education Office located in the Scarfe Building. PEDH program students in 4th Year should confirm application deadlines with the Faculty of Education. **The following is for information only and should not be regarded as the Faculty of Education's official requirements.** Also, Human Kinetics students should be aware that the School of Human Kinetics' degree requirements (120 credits) have priority over Faculty of Education requirements, and BC College of Teachers requirements.

## Faculty of Education PERFORMANCE REQUIREMENTS FOR MIDDLE AND SECONDARY OPTIONS

- Students in the PEDH Program can fulfill the Faculty of Education's current performance requirement by completing HKIN 103 (Conditioning), HKIN 115B (Developmental Gymnastics and Dance), HKIN 115A\* (Outdoor Pursuits/Aquatics), and by selecting ONE HKIN 215 course.
- \*The Aquatics Performance requirement for the Faculty of Education can also be met by providing documented proof of any ONE of the following certifications to the Performance Analysis Coordinator before graduation from the School of Human Kinetics: Bronze Medallion, Bronze Cross, National Lifeguard Certificate. Students choosing this option must select, in consultation with the Performance Analysis Course Coordinator ([gwilson@interchange.ubc.ca](mailto:gwilson@interchange.ubc.ca)), an additional performance analysis course to replace Aquatics.

# ELEMENTARY TEACHING OPTION

## FACULTY OF EDUCATION, PRE-ADMISSION REQUIREMENTS

1. Applicants to the 12 month option are required to have completed a four year degree (120 credits), or its equivalent (e.g. a 3 year degree and 30 additional academic credits).
2. Applicants to the 12 month French Immersion or French as a Second Language option (12 month only) must have completed 9 credits of French at a minimum second year level, including French literature, French grammar and French composition. These credits may be part of, or in addition to, the required 18 senior level credits.
3. Applicants to both the 12 month and 2 year options are required to have completed at least 90 credits (including the prerequisite coursework) from the Humanities, Social Sciences, Visual and Performing Arts, Sciences, Human Kinetics/Physical Education or Music. Professional coursework in, e.g. Commerce, Early Childhood Education, Education, Engineering, Law, Nursing, Social Work, youth and child-care will not fulfil this requirement.

- 1) **6 credits of English Literature and Composition**
- 2) **6 credits of English Literature acceptable only 3 of Composition**
- 3) **3 credits of a laboratory Science**  
A course in Science containing a regular Science laboratory session (tutorial sessions do not fulfill this requirement)
- 4) **3 credits of Mathematics**  
Statistics or Business Math NOT acceptable
- 5) **3 credits of Canadian History or Geography**
- 6) **3 credits of Canadian Studies**  
Selected from Canadian History, Geography, Sociology, Literature, etc.  
Content must pertain solely to the Canadian society, its culture or literature.

**C:** 18 credits (third or fourth year) from any combination of courses from List A and B with no more than 12 credits from any one discipline from List B.

# MIDDLE SCHOOL TEACHING OPTION

## FACULTY OF EDUCATION, PRE-ADMISSION REQUIREMENTS

### 1) **Four year degree or equivalent (3 year degree plus 30 university credits):**

The content of the degree must include courses to satisfy the requirements below. If not, an applicant must complete additional courses.

### 2) **6 credits of English literature and composition:**

Two 3 credit courses in English Literature or the combination of a 3 credit course in each of English Literature and Composition. English Grammar, Linguistics, Creative Writing, Technical or Business Writing or Communication courses will not fulfill this requirement.

### 3) **A minimum 3 credits of a laboratory Science:**

Must be a course in Science containing a regular Science lab session. Tutorial or video session or field trip alone will not fulfill this requirement. Normally selected from the Life Sciences, Biology, Chemistry, Physical Geography, Geology, Astronomy or Physics. Psychology, Human Kinetics (Physical Education), Applied Science (e.g. Computer Science) do not fulfill this requirement.

4) **A minimum 3 credits of Mathematics:** Statistics, Business, or Finance Math will not fulfill this requirement.

### 5) **3 credits of History or Geography (Social Studies requirement):**

Art History, Geology, Oceanography or Physical Geography courses do not satisfy this requirement.

### 6) **6 credits of Canadian content course(s):**

The Faculty's Canadian content requirement is "6 credits of courses in Humanities and/or Social Sciences with significant Canadian content applicable to teaching the middle school curriculum".

The Faculty recommends courses such as Canadian Literature, Canadian Studies, Canadian History, Canadian Geography, Geography of BC, etc.

### 7) **Specialization – PHYSICAL AND HEALTH EDUCATION**

Applicants normally have completed the Physical & Health Education Option within the Bachelor of Human Kinetics (Physical and Health Education) program. The Physical Education specialization requirement for the Middle Years option is the same as the Concentration requirements for secondary Physical Education.

#### 1) **18 credits of foundational Human Kinetics courses**

a) **12 credits must include** Anatomy; Physiology; Growth & Development; and Human Motor Behaviour.

HKIN 190,191, 284, 230

b) **6 credits from:** Active Health (Fitness); Biomechanics; Sport & Exercise Psychology; and Exercise Physiology.

HKIN 103, 151, 231, 275

(Completion of HKIN 103 (Active Health/Fitness) can also be used towards fulfillment of performance requirements as outlined in #3 below).

#### 2) **18 credits of third/fourth year level Human Kinetics courses:**

a) **12 credits from** Adapted Physical Education; Instructional Analysis and Design in Sport & Physical Activity Programs; Games Education; Planning Physical Education Sport & Exercise Programs; and Athletic Injuries.

HKIN 362, 369, 415, 400, 361

b) **6 credits from** Physical Education Fieldwork; Foundations of Coaching; High Performance Conditioning in Physical Activity & Sport; Coaching Effectiveness in Selected Sports & Activities; Exercise Prescription; and Health Promotion,

(see note 2), 469, 464

(Recreation, leisure, fitness or health services course cannot be used to fulfill requirements).

#### 3) **7 Performance Areas:**

# Appendix I - Human Kinetics Course Descriptions

- 103** (3) *Active Health* – Role of physical activity in the maintenance of a healthy life. Application of basic physical fitness and exercise methods, exercise techniques and fitness appraisal. [2-2]
- 115** (3) *Performance Analysis of Selected Individual Sports And Activities* – Specific topics to be announced each year. Equivalency: HKIN 210. HKIN 115 and 215 can be taken in any order. [2-2]
- 151** (3) *Biomechanics I* – Application of elementary principles of physics and math to a quantitative analysis of movement. Analysis will also focus on the development of forces within muscles and their effect on initiating and controlling human movement. [3-0]
- 161** (3) *Leisure and Sport in Society* – Introduction to the political, economic and social basis of leisure and sport; concepts, theories and problems. [3-0]
- 190** (3) *Anatomy and Physiology I* – Structure and function of the neuromuscular and skeletal systems of the human body. Special emphasis on movement analysis and the physiological effects of exercise. Equivalency: HKIN 290. [2-2]
- 191** (3) *Anatomy and Physiology II* – Structure and function of the digestive, endocrine, urinary, circulatory and respiratory systems. Special emphasis on effects of exercise. Equivalency: HKIN 291. [2-2]
- 215** (3) *Performance Analysis of Selected Team Sports And Activities* – Specific topics to be announced each year. HKIN 115 and 215 can be taken in any order. [2-2]
- 230** (3) *Human Motor Behaviour I* – Processes underlying human movement and learning motor skills and factors influencing acquisition, performance and movement control. Prerequisite: second-year standing. Equivalency: HKIN 368. [3-0-0]
- 231** (3) *Sport and Exercise Psychology* – Psychological theories and research related to sport and exercise behaviour. Prerequisite: second-year standing. Equivalency: HKIN 364. [3-0-0]
- 252** (3) *Contemporary Health Issues* – Examination of health issues, relevant to contemporary lifestyle, physical activity, and careers in the health and fitness field. The development of skills in critical thinking and consumerism as they relate to health and fitness. Prerequisite: second-year standing. [3-0]
- 261** (3) *Health Policy & Society* – Analysis of health policy and the social context related to active health. Prerequisite: HKIN 161 and second-year standing. [3-0]
- 275** (3) *Exercise Physiology I* – Acute and chronic effects of exercise on body systems; basic concepts of cardiovascular, respiratory and muscular responses to physical activity. Prerequisite: All of HKIN 190, HKIN 191. Second-year standing. [2-0-2]
- 284** (3) *Physical Growth and Motor Development* – Characteristics of physical growth and motor development related to physical activity; factors affecting, and measurements of, physical growth and motor development. Prerequisite: second-year standing. [3-0]
- 292** (3) *Leisure and Sport Event Management* – Issues and strategies of leisure and sport event management are examined. Prerequisite: HKIN 161 and second-year standing. [3-0]
- 303** (3) *High Performance Conditioning in Physical Activity and Sport* – Conditioning methods, exercise techniques and appraisal methods for fitness in high performance physical activity and sport. Prerequisites: HKIN 103, 190, and 191 and third-year standing. [2-2]
- 330** (3) *Human Motor Behaviour II* – Acquisition, performance, and control of skilled movements. Processes and underlying mechanisms involved in learning and performing motor skills. Prerequisite: third-year standing. Students can receive credit for only one of HKIN 330 or HKIN 468. [2-2]

# Appendix I - Human Kinetics Course Descriptions

- 351 (3) **Biomechanics II - Mechanical Properties of Tissues** – Mechanics of muscular contraction and how the mechanical properties of the muscle, ligaments, tendons, and bone work synergistically. Prerequisite: third-year standing. Equivalency: HKIN 473. [2-2]
- 353 (3) **Human Body Composition** – Examination of techniques for measuring the amounts of adipose tissue, muscle and bone in the body, and factors affecting body composition, with particular emphasis on physical activity. Prerequisite: third-year standing. [3-0]
- 361 (3) **Introduction to Athletic Training** – Recognition, prevention, and first aid treatment of common sports injuries. Laboratory sessions emphasize principles and techniques of basic protective taping and strapping. Prerequisites: All of HKIN 190, 191 and third-year standing. [2-2]
- 362 (3) **Adapted Physical Activity** – For persons with disabilities; a developmental, lifelong approach to programming. Includes fieldwork. Prerequisite: third-year standing. [2-0-2]
- 365 (3) **Foundations of Coaching** – Methods of athletic conditioning, planning the program, psychology of training and coaching, athletic evaluation. Prerequisite: third-year standing. [3-0]
- 366 (3) **Movement Experiences for Young Children** – The design and implementation of movement experiences for children in early childhood years. Prerequisite: third-year standing. [3-0]
- 367 (3) **Leisure and Disabled Persons** – Policy issues relating to leisure opportunities for persons with disabilities. Prerequisite: third-year standing. [3-0]
- 369 (3) **Instructional Analysis and Design in Sport and Physical Activity Programs** – Instructional design and technologies applied to sport and physical activity programs. Prerequisite: third-year standing. [2-2]
- 371 (3) **Introduction to Statistics and Research Methodology** – Descriptive statistics, norms, normal probability curve; concepts of correlation, reliability and validity; statistical inference. Principles of research methodologies used in the study of sport and physical activity. Prerequisite: third-year standing. [3-0]
- 373 (3) **Research Methods in Human Kinetics** – Critical evaluation of research studies and methods with emphasis on the physical activity context. Prerequisite: third-year standing. Students can receive credit for only one of HKIN 373, HKIN 370 or 372. [3-0]
- 375 (3) **Exercise Physiology II** – Transport of oxygen during exercise in humans. Regulation and integration of the cardiovascular and respiratory systems during exercise. Prerequisite: third-year standing. Equivalency: HKIN 463. [3-0]
- 381 (3) **Sociological Aspects of Sport** – Selected aspects of sport examined in relation to modern social structures and cultures. Prerequisite: third-year standing. [3-0]
- 382 (3) **Meaning and Values in Sport** – An analysis of the experience of sports activities. Prerequisites: HKIN 261 and third-year standing. [3-0]
- 383 (3) **The Olympic Games: Ancient And Modern** – Prerequisite: third-year standing. [3-0]
- 389 (3) **Neuromuscular Integration of Human Movement** – The neurophysiological and functional neuroanatomical processes involved in the sensory and motor control of movement, posture and balance in the Human. Peripheral and central sensorimotor structures and neurological diseases that effect human movement and balance control will be discussed. Prerequisite: HKIN 191 and third-year standing. [3-0]

- 392 (3) *The Leisure and Sport Industry* – Economic and financial issues in the leisure and sport industry. Topics include entrepreneurship, economic impact, commercialization, patterns of ownership and control, and selected financial practices. Prerequisite: COMM 457 and third-year standing. [3-0]
- 400 (3) *Planning Physical Education, Sport and Exercise Programs* – Processes, techniques and considerations in the planning, implementation and evaluation of physical education, sport and exercise programs in both public and private agencies. Prerequisite: third-year standing. [3-0]
- 420 (3/9) *Coaching Effectiveness in Selected Sports and Activities* – Specific topics to be announced each year. Prerequisite: Appropriate 200-level Performance Analysis course; third-year standing. [3-0]
- 454 (3/6) *Field Experience* – Analytical observations and supervised professional practice in physical activity and leisure settings as required for each specific program of study. See Undergraduate Advising Centre for specific prerequisites for each section. Students must take the section relevant to their programs of study. Prerequisite: third-year standing and **specific requirements for each section (see page 19)**. [1-0-2]
- 455 (15) *Field Work and Field Research Practicum* – Field work and a field research project will be undertaken concurrently in a cooperating leisure, sport or other agency over one term in fourth year (30 hours per week). Students will also attend weekly seminars to discuss fieldwork and the field research projects. Prerequisites: Fourth Year standing in Human Kinetics, HKIN 371 or 372, and approval from 455 Coordinator. Limited Enrolment.
- 461 (3) *Prevention of Sport Injuries I* – Training and safety strategies for the prevention of injuries to the musculoskeletal system and sense organs. Prerequisites: All of HKIN 190, 191 361, 363 and third-year standing. Corequisite: HKIN 463. [3-0]
- 463 (3) *Physiology of Exercise* – Study of the acute and chronic effects of exercise on body systems; and relationship of the functional capacity of individual systems to maximal human performance. Prerequisites: HKIN 190 and 191 or ANAT 390, BIOL 353 and third-year standing. [2-2]
- 464 (3) *Health Promotion and Physical Activity* – Current perspectives on health promotion and health education; design and implementation of health promotion strategies in a variety of arenas, particularly health promotion/education strategies aimed at encouraging physical activity. Prerequisite: HKIN 252 and third-year. [3-0]
- 468 (3) *Human Motor Performance* – Acquisition, performance and control of skilled movements. Processes and underlying mechanisms involved in learning and performing motor skills. Prerequisite: third-year standing. [2-2]
- 469 (3) *Exercise Prescription* - Theory and methods of fitness appraisal and exercise prescription for normal and special populations. Pre- or corequisites: HKIN 370 and 463. Prerequisite: third-year standing. [3-0]
- 471 (3) *Prevention of Sport Injuries II* - Training and safety strategies for the prevention of injuries or disorders of internal organs and central nervous system. Environmental and nutritional factors in conditioning and pre-event preparation. Prerequisite: HKIN 461 and third-year standing. [3-0]
- 473 (3) *Human Biomechanical Analysis* – Advanced quantitative analysis of human motion. Prerequisite: HKIN 363 or first-year Physics and third-year standing. [3-0]
- 481 (3) *Sport Marketing and Communication* – A seminar on the application of social science theories and methods to sport marketing and communication. Prerequisite: COMM 465 and third-year standing. [3-0]
- 489 (3/6) *Seminar* – Current topics and research in specific areas. Prerequisite: third-year standing. [3-0; 3-0]
- 492 (3) *Human Resource Development in Leisure and Sport Agency* – Human resource development issues and strategies are examined in leisure and sport environments. Prerequisite: COMM 329 and third-year standing. [3-0]
- 499 (3) *Projects in Human Kinetics* – Provides opportunities to perform research pertaining to a chosen area of human kinetics. Prerequisites: completion of third-year and permission of Associate Director, Undergraduate Affairs.
